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Public Health Launches Nurse Family Partnership

As of May 1, the Family Health Program of the Santa Cruz County Health Services Agency has begun servicing first-time, low-income expectant mothers through the Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP).

From the NFP website (<http://www.nursefamilypartnership.org>): Public health nurses are the backbone of Nurse-Family Partnership's success. Since the program's beginning, nurses have been instrumental in shaping and delivering this evidence-based, community health program. Because of their specialized knowledge, the public health nurses who deliver the Nurse-Family Partnership program in their communities establish trusted relationships with young, at-risk mothers during home visits, providing guidance for the emotional, social, and physical challenges these first-time moms face as they prepare to become parents. But most importantly, Nurse-Family Partnership nurse home visitors make a measurable, long-lasting difference in the lives of their clients... [to] have healthy pregnancies, improve child health and development, and become more economically self-sufficient.

The Santa Cruz County NFP launch is being made possible by donations from the Central California Alliance for Health, Kaiser Permanente, Dignity Health Dominican Hospital, Sutter Maternity & Surgery Center, Watsonville Community Hospital, First Five Santa Cruz County and Community Foundation Santa Cruz County.

Referrals to NFP can be made with the standard Family Health Program referral form which allows clients to be considered for both the NFP and Field Nursing Program designed to support pregnant, and/or parenting women with a high risk infant or child. 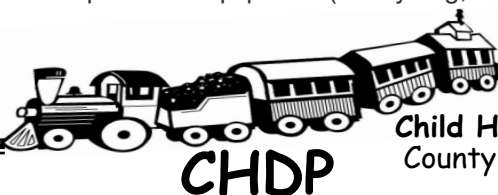
California Department of Social Services (CDSS) Shares Drowning Prevention Message

Drowning takes the lives of more California toddlers than any other kind of accident. Children who manage to survive a "near drowning" often suffer permanent brain damage from lack of oxygen. Children one to four years old are at greatest risk. They are very active and curious, and they learn new skills every day. One day they suddenly learn how to open the sliding door and wander from the house to the pool and spa area. A child may fall in and drown silently without calling out for help. The whole event can happen in just a minute or two. Most of these drownings take place at the homes of parents, relatives or neighbors.

Safety Guide For Home Swimming Pools and Spas

- Supervision of children around water is not "normal" supervision, where we check on a child every couple of minutes.
- When around water, children must be kept in direct sight at all times.
- Children in water or next to water can drown immediately and silently, so there is no room for error.
- Never leave a young child alone in or around a pool, spa or wading pool, even for a few seconds.
- When young children are in or around the pool or spa, assign a "Water Watcher" to keep them in DIRECT SIGHT. Relieve the watcher every 20 minutes.
- Get into the habit of keeping doors and gates leading to water closed, even when using the pool or spa. Never prop doors or gates open.
- Be especially alert at the start and end of "planned" pool time for toddlers.
- If a child is missing, ALWAYS look first in the pool or spa. Seconds count!
- Keep rescue equipment (safety ring, long pole) and a phone next to the pool or spa.

HIPAA Conversion Project Continues: PM-160 Updates

Santa Cruz County CHDP continues to work closely with state staff, regional counterparts, and the *Central California Alliance for Health* to support all providers through this process.

CHDP Code Conversion Readiness Checklist

The following checklist has been prepared in anticipation of implementation of the *Bright Futures Periodicity Schedule* and transition of Child Health and Disability Prevention (CHDP) claims processing to the California Medicaid Management Information System (CA-MMIS).

The goal of the CHDP transition and code conversion is to replace two-digit local CHDP codes with HIPAA-compliant CPT-4 procedure codes. This transition impacts qualified Medi-Cal providers enrolled in the CHDP program who currently bill on the CHDP proprietary claim form, *Confidential Screening and Billing Report* (PM 160). CHDP Early and Periodic, Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT) services must be billed on a *CMS-1500, UB-04* or electronic equivalent as follows:

- Laboratory-only services billed by clinical laboratory providers: Claims with dates of service on or after February 1, 2017
- Well-child health assessments/vaccines and laboratory in combination with other services: Claims with dates of service on or after July 1, 2017

The PM 160 claim form will continue in use for laboratory-only services claims for dates of service prior to February 1, 2017 and all other CHDP services for dates of service prior to July 1, 2017. Providers should note that national codes cannot be submitted on the PM 160.

The following readiness checklist is intended to be a general guide, not a comprehensive project plan. Medi-Cal recommends that providers use this checklist as a guideline to prepare themselves for the code conversion implementation.

The purpose of the Child Health and Disability Prevention (CHDP) Program Health Assessment Guidelines (Guidelines) is to set CHDP provider standards for pediatric health assessments for children served by the CHDP Program. The state of California CHDP program is implementing CHDP periodicity schedules to conform with the American Academy of Pediatrics [Bright Futures Recommendations for Periodic Preventive Health Care](#), which are also used by Medi-Cal managed care health plans.

This set of revisions to the Guidelines was coordinated by the CHDP Health Assessment Guidelines Workgroup, consisting of State of California and local health agency CHDP staff. The workgroup would like to thank the Systems of Care Division Executive staff, the CHDP Executive Committee members, and the American Academy of Pediatrics in providing advice, authorship, and/or review of the Guidelines.

County-Wide Hepatitis A Outbreak

The Public Health Division in the County of Santa Cruz has been investigating an increased number of Hepatitis A cases. Since April 2017, the County has 24 confirmed cases. They usually have 1-2 confirmed cases per year. The investigation is ongoing and challenging because of the long incubation period of the disease (15 to 50 days) and the difficulty experienced to contact many individuals sickened with the illness who are homeless and/or illicit drug users. To date, no common source of food, beverage, or other cause has been identified; as a result, the source of the outbreak remains undetermined.

Clinicians should **promptly report confirmed and suspect cases of HAV** to Santa Cruz County Public Health / Communicable Disease Unit (CDU) via **fax to (831) 454-5049** using the [Confidential Morbidity Report \(CMR\)](#).

- Copies of pertinent laboratory testing results and clinical notes should be included.
- Collection of contact information and travel history is of utmost importance.
